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Japan's Long-Term Commitment to Global Health

- Japan has been leading international discussions on global health for more than two decades.
- More recently, recognizing Universal Health Coverage (UHC) as an essential basis for sustainable and inclusive growth, Japan has put a special emphasis on accelerating progress towards UHC in LMICs.

 - Hokkaido-Toyako G8 Summit (2008)
 - Sustainable Development Goals, target 3.8 (2015)
 - Ise-Shima G7 Summit (2016)
 - TICAD VI in Nairobi (2016)

 - G20 Joint Finance & Health Ministers' Meeting (2019)
 - UN UHC High-level Meeting (2019)

*Universal Health Coverage (UHC) means that all people have access to the health services they need, when and where they need them, without financial hardship. (Source: WHO)

Global Health Governance in the Age of COVID-19

- COVID-19 as a reminder of the importance of international coordination ("No one is safe until every one is safe")
- Health is a foundation of all economic activities - "global public goods"
- Involves various stakeholders and financing mechanisms (such as private-public partnership organizations (i.e. GFATM, Gavi, CEPI, GFF, Unitaid etc.), ACT-A and COVAX)

WHO IPPPR

-> Recommendations to enhance preparedness against infectious diseases including establishment of Global Health Threats Council under UN

100 Days Mission

-> Recommendations to harness scientific innovation and strengthen public and

private collaboration to reduce the time from discovery to

deployment of diagnostics, therapeutics and vaccines in future health crisis.

G20 High Level Independent Panel

-> Recommendations to establish Global Health Threats Board and Global Health Threats Fund Pandemic Treaty to strengthen WHO to better respond to future pandemics

Japan's New Global Health Strategy Policy Goals

- More Resilient and Equitable Universal Health Coverage
- Prevention, Preparedness and Response for Future Pandemic

Japan's New Global Health Strategy Salient Elements in Health Service Delivery

- To improve health system to ensure UHC
- To invest in Primary Health Care
- To address infectious diseases, NCDs, maternal and child healthcare and nutrition
- To continue to provide essential health services in public health crisis
- To protect the vulnerable populations such as poor people, discriminated people, disabled people, sexual minorities and people in move
- To ensure equitable access to health services and medicines at national and global levels in public health crisis
- To coordinate entities concerned

Japan's New Global Health Strategy Other Salient Elements

- Strengthened surveillance
- Empowered human resources
- Appropriate allocation of resources
- Surge financing mechanism for public health crisis
- Support R&D for rapid deployment of diagnosis, therapeutics and vaccines
- Cross sectoral approaches: Education, Water and Sanitation, Nutrition, Gender Equality, Human Rights and Economy

Japan's New Global Health Strategy Contribution to Global Health Governance

- Global Health Architecture to sufficiently and rapidly respond to public health crisis
- Collaboration between finance and health officials for resilient and sustainable system
- Cross-sectoral analysis of gaps in financial and human resources, services, system and infrastructure
- Cooperation with international organizations such as UN, WHO and World Bank and public private partnership funds such as GFATM, Gavi and CEPI

Japan's New Global Health Strategy Bilateral Efforts

- Establish 'Health Partnership' with Ghana, India and Vietnam
- Utilize bilateral and multilateral ODA, other official finance, private sector cooperation and academic collaboration
- Realize 'More Resilient and Equitable UHC' on the ground

Japan's New Global Health Strategy Collaboration with Various Stakeholders

important partner for global health
entity to develop medicines and medical equipment
contributor to national growth strategy

partner for implementation of services on the ground advocate for the vulnerable entity for evaluation of policies

Japan's New Global Health Strategy Schedule

- Draft framework was agreed upon in September 2021
- Interim Report to be formulated in December 2021
- Final Strategy Report to be completed by June 2022
